## January Meeting By Eric Freberg

January marked the transition of the Malted Barley Appreciation Society's presidential responsibilities from Eric to Lucy, in exchange for the role of 'first spouse'.

The meeting was, of course, a rousing success,



thanks in large part to guest speaker our Mark Burford. Mark has been a mainstay of the brewing industry on Long Island. Previous ventures included the New York Homebrew supply shop, the tiny Cobblestone Brewery and Winery in Huntington, and the LIBC in Jericho. Today Mark is the brewer and coowner of the Blue

Point Brewing Company in Patchogue, which has enjoyed a fair amount of success in its two and a half years. In fact, Blue Point is in the process of expanding its capacity from 9 tanks to thirteen and has introduced their Winter Ale in bottles, to go along with their flagship Toasted Lager. Draft offerings include Oatmeal Stout, Pilsner, and various seasonal brews. Also, Blue Point has enlisted Clare Rose as a distributor, having previously handled the task on its own. Clare Rose is an independent distributor of Bud, but Mark needs not fear the competition as they also handle Heineken, which keeps Blue Point somewhat out of Bud's radar.

Mark must have remembered something about the club from his last visit a few years ago, because the beer he brought us was his Barleywine (a 5-gal keg! We kicked it, too!). He makes two versions of it, both called Old Howling Bastard – a 9% which comes out around Thanksgiving, and an 11% during

the height of Barleywine season in February. It was full-bodied with a huge blast of hop flavor and aroma, coming from Magnum, Cascade, Willamette, Goldings, and Styrian Goldings varieties.

Note, there will be a year-old cask of OHB at this year's Split Thy (Brooklyn) Skull festival, which comes to Mug's Ale House on March 9.

Although not a brewpub, Blue Point offers tours and has a tasting room open Thursday, Friday, and Saturday afternoon (check website for hours). Although it's generally only available on Long Island, it can be found at a few locations in Manhattan, including David Copperfields bar and American Beer distributor.


# Heavyweight Brewing Company Ocean Township, NJ
